

Breeding birds and migrants of Persia

Iran is a large country which until recently has been a difficult destination for birders to visit. Birdwatching Breaks is therefore pleased to offer you a comprehensive birding tour of this fascinating country for birds and culture. We should encounter the country's two endemics, Pleske's Ground-Jay and Caspian Tit, while other regional specialities we are likely to see include Basra Reed Warbler, Iraq Babbler, breeding Grey Hypocolius, Sind Woodpecker and Black-headed Penduline-Tit.

Days 1-2: An evening flight from London to Tehran, where arrival is the following morning. On arrival, we take an internal flight to the southern city of Bandar Abbas, situated on the shores of Persian Gulf. The waterfront at Bandar Abbas attracts thousands of birds to feed on the extensive mudflats. Habitats here consist of stony out-washed plains with scattered vegetations and bushes, almond and pistachio woodlands and cliffs. Birds include a number of Indo-Malayan species and we should see White-eared Bulbul, Turkestan and Bay-backed Shrikes, Pallid Swift, Pale Crag-Martin, Eastern Orphean Warbler, Afghan Babbler, See-see Partridge, Eurasian Hoopoe, Hume's and Variable Wheatears and Scrub Warbler. Continue to Minab for a three-night stay.

Day 3: Early morning drive along the road towards Jask, where palm gardens and local orchards create an ideal habitat for many woodland birds: Oriental Honey-buzzard, Spotted Owlet, Grey Francolin, Red-wattled

Lapwing, Indian Roller, Laughing Dove, Lesser Whitethroat, Common Myna, Isabelline Wheatear, Purple Sunbird and the rare and regional endemic Sind Woodpecker. In the driest habitats and wadis we may find Sand Lark, Graceful Prinia, Green Bee-eater, Chestnut-bellied and Crowned Sandgrouse and Ménétries's, Upcher's and Eastern Orphean Warblers. With luck, we may find Oriental White-eye and Clamorous Reed Warblers among the mangroves herons along the shoreline.

Day 4: Full day excursion to the mangrove forest and inter-tidal areas in the Persian Gulf. This is an excellent habitat for Indian Pond Heron, Crab Plover, Shikra, Greater Spotted Eagle, Western Marsh Harrier, Osprey, White-breasted Kingfisher and Greater Thick-knee. High numbers of migrant shorebirds use the area as a migration stop-over point and wintering ground. We should encounter Greater and Lesser Sandpipers, Grey and Kentish Plovers, Common Greenshank, Common Redshank, Whimbrel, Temminck's Stint, Sanderling, Eurasian Spoonbill, Dalmatian Pelican, Great Cormorant, Green Sandpiper, Black-tailed and Bar-tailed Godwits and Eurasian

Oystercatcher. With luck we may see Great Knot, Broad-billed Sandpiper and Indian Pond-Heron.

Days 5-6: Morning flight to Ahvaz. Upon arrival we drive to the north of the city and bird the Karkheh and Dez river systems. This is an important area for Iraq Babbler, Grey Hypocolius, Mesopotamian Crow and Ménétries's Warbler. Another primary quarry is the range-restricted Basra Reed Warbler. Other birds to expect are Dead Sea Sparrow and Black-winged Kite, and we will encounter large numbers of Red-wattled Lapwing, Blue-cheeked Bee-eater, White-throated and Pied Kingfishers, Collared Pratincole and European Turtle Dove. Possibilities include Turkestan Shrike, Pied Bushchat and Namaqua Dove. Return to Ahvaz for an overnight stay.

Day 7: Morning trip to Shadegan Lagoon, where the multitudes of waterbirds may include specialities such as Marbled Duck and White-tailed Lapwing. Breeding Collared Pratincoles and Little Terns mingle with migrants including Marsh and Wood Sandpiper. After lunch in Ahvaz, we take an afternoon flight to Tehran. Upon arrival, direct transfer to hotel for rest and an overnight stop.

Day 8: Morning drive to Touran National Park, where we stay for two nights in a local house. Touran consists of vast steppes and semi-arid deserts. Our main interest is locating the endemic Pleske's Ground Jay, which favours bushy steppes. We also hope to find Shikra, Asian Desert Warbler, Crowned Sandgrouse, Bar-tailed and Crested Larks, Pale Crag Martin and Trumpeter and Desert Finches, while there is a chance of Cream-

coloured Courser, Sykes's Warbler and Pale Rock Sparrow. Common migrants include Green Warbler and Red-breasted Flycatcher.

Day 9: Early morning birdwatching in Touran to find the endemic Pleske's Ground-Jay, in case we have missed it on Day 9. Other possible birds in the area include Steppe Eagle, Pallid Harrier, Saker Falcon, Macqueen's Bustard, Black-bellied Sandgrouse, Grey-necked Bunting, Masked Wagtail, Hooded Wheatear and Eastern Rock Nuthatch. We hope to find the rare Onager (Asian Wild Ass) and, with luck, we may be able to make out tracks of Asiatic Cheetah, of which fewer than a hundred remain in the deserts of Iran.

Day 10: Depending on sightings of the previous two days, we make another visit to Touran and then drive to Semnan for a three-night stay.

Day 11: Full day excursion to Parvar, a protected area which is located in the central eastern slopes of the Alborz mountain range. Upper habitats include humid and dry high alpine zones. Parvar also covers some semi-arid Artemisia steppe in the southern parts. Widespread species are Golden Eagle, Chukar, Water Pipit, Rufous-tailed Rock Thrush and Rock Bunting. Red-fronted Serin, Radde's and Alpine Accentors, and Grey-necked Bunting should be encountered. If luck is on our side, we may see the likes of Caspian Snowcock, White-throated Robin, or Rufous-backed Redstart.

Day 12: Early morning drive to Molla-Deh and Roodbarak in the northern slopes of the Parvar Valley, a region of Caspian broad leaf forests and home to the rare Caspian Tit. Other species occurring include Lammergeier, Yellow-billed and Red-billed Choughs, Horned Lark, Eastern Goldfinch and Pied, Isabelline and Finsch's Wheatears.

Day 13: Drive to Balbosar, on the Caspian Sea coast, to look for Black-headed Penduline-tits. Then continue, via a mountainous road through the Alborz Mountain Range, with a stop for birding in the mountain habitats along the road, especially in high elevation regions. Possible species include White-winged Snowfinch. Continue to Tehran for an overnight stay.

Day 14: Early morning transfer to the airport and connections back to Europe.
